GOSPEL

The Gospel for the Third Sunday of Lent is taken from the Gospel of St John 2:13-25

Just before the Jewish Passover Jesus went up to Jerusalem, and in the Temple he found people selling cattle and sheep and pigeons, and the money changers sitting at their counters there.

Making a whip out of some cord, he drove them all out of the Temple, cattle and sheep as well, scattered the money changers' coins, knocked their tables over and said to the pigeon-sellers, 'Take all this out of here and stop turning my Father's house into a market.'

Then his disciples remembered the words of scripture: Zeal for your house will devour me. The Jews intervened and said, 'What sign can you show us to justify what you have done?'

Jesus answered, 'Destroy this sanctuary, and in three days I will raise it up'. The Jews replied, 'It has taken forty-six years to build this sanctuary: are you going to raise it up in three days?' But he was speaking of the sanctuary that was his body, and when Jesus rose from the dead, his disciples remembered that he had said this, and they believed the scripture and the words he had said.

During his stay in Jerusalem for the Passover many believed in his name when they saw the signs that he gave, but Jesus knew them all and did not trust himself to them; he never needed evidence about any man; he could tell what a man had in him.

The Gospel of the Lord

A reflection on the Gospel for the 3rd Sunday of Lent.

The so-called clearing of the temple in all four gospels. In Matthew, Mark and Luke the event appears much closer to the events of Holy Week when Jesus is crucified suggesting there that this was the reason for His assassination.

Much earlier in John's gospel. Throughout the whole of John's gospel is a suggestion that Jesus is in fact setting up a new temple, a new worship, a new way of relating to God.

It is important to keep in mind the significance of the Temple for the Jew. The temple was the sign of God's presence in the world. The theme of the temple was 'God is present'. The temple held the story and the memory of the chosen people and the story of the God who specially chose them and set them apart. This is the same God who led them through the desert as cloud by day and flame by night, the God guiding and leading through Moses, the same God who provided especially for them in the manna, who enabled them walk through the sea on dry ground. This was the Great God whose presence the temple marked. So when Jesus goes in and overturns the money tables and lashes out at the money changers, He is undermining something that is at the very heart of every pious Jew and so it is viewed as an act of blasphemy, a deep insult. And then the suggestion that it would be destroyed and built then so quickly, three days? It is useful to remember that the time of the writing of John's gospel was in fact after the time the temple was destroyed in 70AD. This moment is the backdrop for the whole gospel drama as it happens.

In clearing the temple and in speaking of its destruction Jesus is pointing to a new kind of worship and a new temple. Jesus, by his words and deeds is God definitively present among His people. As John puts it more poetically in the beginning of his gospel: In Jesus God has pitched his tent in order to live among his people; here 'the word was made flesh and lived among us.' The new temple. The new sacred space. The temple of his risen body ... destroyed in death and in three days raised in glory!

St Paul, of course, speaks of the human body as the temple, something we are reminded of at every funeral when we honour the bodies of those we love with the blessing of Holy Water and the rising sweet-smelling smoke of burning incense. With Jesus as the cornerstone we become the new temple, built of living stones. The altar of the Lord's presence is our own lives, our families. May our prayer of Lent unmask God's presence for us here!
